Like all over the world, football, or soccer, is probably the most preferred game for children in Palestine. Thus, in 2009 CWB has established its first soccer academy in Palestine, titled John Paul II Football Academy, and launched a project entitled Building Character through Football. Since that date, the academy has provided playgrounds and offered training schedules to more than 1,200 children that participate in branches in cities throughout Palestine, among them Jenin, Jericho, Jerusalem, Ramallah, Bethlehem, and Gaza.

The Bethlehem branch is considered one of the most important branches since it has the largest number of participants in its three sub-branches in Beit Sahour, Beit Jala, and Bethlehem. The John Paul II Football Academy has a strong and strategic relationship with the Municipality of Bethlehem which shares its mission of supporting youth, a relationship through which the academy has come to be the representative of the municipality in sport events in Bethlehem and abroad. Thus, the Bethlehem youth football team has participated twice in the tournament of Brescia, Italy, where it achieved second place when it participated for the first time in 2014, and first place in 2015. Locally, the team has also been very successful, as it is considered the champion in the southern region and number two in all of Palestine.
